Our approach this week has been centred around the children's wellbeing and this has been clearly visible from the atmosphere around the school. All the teachers have been delivering many lessons outdoors (when it hasn't been raining) where the children have been learning actively, they have had outdoor PE lessons and lots of movement breaks. We have had Science week too, so the children have been engaged daily in lots of fun science lessons.

We were also delighted to see that nearly every child in the school has returned this week. We would like to thank you for trusting the school and the staff to look after your children and that you too value the importance of not only their academic development but also their social and emotional wellbeing. We know how much these have all been affected during the last year. As we look now to the future, we hope that this will be the last school closure and that the children can continue to embrace uninterrupted and high quality education.

Remote Learning

If your child is self isolating and waiting the results of a COVID 19 test or your child has had a positive COVID 19 test result and so therefore also self isolating, we have class work prepared and uploaded to the website so the impact on your children's learning is minimized.

Lockdown rules for England from 8 March



Stay home - only leave for work, essential shopping, exercise or medical appointments



Exercise allowed outdoors once a day, in your local area. You can exercise with your household, support bubble, or one other person



All schools open, with outdoor after-school sports and activities allowed.



Two people can meet outdoors to socialise eg to sit down for a coffee, drink or picnic



Care home residents are allowed one regular visitor, with whom they can hold hands



No household mixing indoors or outdoors unless in your support or childcare bubble



Non-essential shops, leisure and entertainment venues closed



Pubs and restaurants closed, but takeaway food permitted

This week you were sent home a letter from Jim McManus the director for Public Health and I would like to re-emphasise some of his key messages for parents to follow:

- 1) Don't arrange playdates, sleepovers or parties even if your children are now in a school bubble, bubbles only exist in school alongside stringent infection control measures. Outside of school, the latest Government guidance still applies to parents and children.
- 2) If you have older children, please explain they cannot hang out with their friends just yet we know kids will find it hard to understand why they can't spend time with their friends from their school bubble outside of school. Please explain if we all follow the guidance now, we will hopefully be able to spend time together soon

Science Week

This week, the children returned to a fun filled and exciting science week across the school. I spoke to some children about what they had been learning about. Here are their responses:

Sam T and Louis (Reception) - "We powered cars with balloons. We blew the balloon up and then we let go of the balloon. The air came out of it and pushed the car forwards. The bigger the balloon was blown up, the further the car went. We also learnt that we breathe in oxygen and breathe out carbon dioxide. We planted flowers in tyres in the garden too."

Amelia (Year 1) - "We did an experiment with water called 'Dancing Raisins'. We put still water in one cup and fizzy water in another cup. Then we put the raisins in the cups. With the still water, the raising sunk to the bottom of the cup but with the fizzy water, the raisins did sink to the bottom but then the bubbles pushed it to the top and then it sank again. It kept doing this. We have had lots of fun experiments this week"

Isabelle (Year 2) - "Science week has been great. On Monday, we made a life cycle wheel of a sunflower and on Tuesday, we went on a spring walk and sketched signs of spring. On Wednesday, we planted some beans in mini greenhouses."

Elliot C (Year 3) - "Science week has been fun. We did some biscuit dunking to find out how many dunks it took before the biscuit broke. I did my own experiment at home too with hot and cold water. The rich tea biscuit was the best dunking biscuit."


Zosia (Year 4) - "We used a resource called 'Explorify'. It zooms in on an object. We had to predict what it could be and look for clues in the image. It was quite tricky as we thought that one of the images was a chocolate flake but is a piece of wood. We used our science skills to look for the features. It got us all talking to our partners and made us think a lot."

Jessica (Year 5 Wonders) - "We've been making potions. We were investigating the density of liquids to see which liquid went to the top and which went to the bottom of our containers. In my potion, the golden syrup went to the bottom and the cooking oil came to the top.

Emily (Year 5 Wonders) - "I enjoyed it. I made a poster about Earth and Space and I learnt that it takes the Earth a whole year to orbit the sun.

Aimee (Year 5 Wonders) - "I enjoyed everything about science week. I learnt that the moon is the Earth's only satellite. IT takes the moon 28 days to orbit the Earth. We call this a Lunar month."

Jamie (Year 6) - "We have done more science this week than we normally would. We discussed 'What if humans could live to be 200 years old?" We discussed how many people on the planet there would be and the impact on the environment. Because there would be 3 times more humans in existence, there would only be a third of the forests and this would have a dramatic effect on the air quality that we breathe. The Earth is limiting our life span as it knows this. This wouldn't happen naturally as we only evolve if we need to."















Memorial Tree Planting







The parish council decided that they wanted to plant a new oak tree for future generations to enjoy and wanted the future generation to help plant it. The existing oaks are probably three or four hundred years old. They thought that planting it now, could be a way of remembering the current pandemic in many years to come, and why not ask the children to help, on their last day of their home-schooling. Due to social distancing, they could only invite 6 children, Willow S, Poppy N, Tegan S, Jamie H, Decter H and Harry O'B all helped plant the tree. The tree has been planted by the tennis courts in the playground, next to the community hall.


