## Christmas Enterprise Day

At this time of year, we would normally be having our Enterprise Day and inviting parents, carers and families to come into school to look at all the different Christmas items that the children had made and available to purchase. Like with so many other events at the moment, we are having to be creative and think how we continue with as many school events as possible whilst considering health and safety advice.

This year, the children are busy as ever making and producing items to sell and we launch Enterprise day on  $11^{th}$  December. Unfortunately, we can't welcome you into the school but the classes will be creating a flyer with images of what they are selling and how much the items cost. We are hoping to be able to send you this via Marvellous Me as well as via email and that you will be able to make your purchases and payments via The Gateway. Your chosen products will then be sent home with your child. You will be able to place orders up until 3pm on  $14^{th}$  December.

Enterprise Day provides the children with opportunities to apply skills they have learnt in maths to a real life situation. The older children will be learning about profit and expenditure and all of the classes get to keep the profit made to buy some new resources for their classroom. Last years winners were Pre school who made the most profit so we look forward to seeing the results from this years young entrepreneurs.

### Make a Christingle at home

It's common to have a Christingle service around Christmas time, and is a nice opportunity to do some crafting and think about the meaning behind the festive season. A Christingle is a symbolic object that means 'Christ's light'. It consists of an orange with a candle held in its centre and a red ribbon around it. Four sticks holding fruit and nuts or sweets are pierced into the orange.

The orange represents the world, the red ribbon symbolises Christ's love and blood, the lit candle represents his light in the world, the four sticks symbolise either the four points of a compass or the four seasons and the fruit or sweets represent all of God's creations.

You'll need an orange, a candle, some tin foil, red ribbon, cocktail sticks, dried fruit or sweets, and a pair of scissors. Then you just do this:

- 1. Fasten a red ribbon around the orange
- 2. Cut a small cross into the top of the orange and place a square of tin foil over it (to catch the candle wax as it drops)
- 3. Place the candle on top of the foil and push it firmly into the orange
- 4. Load a mixture of dried fruit or sweets on to the cocktail sticks, ensuring the points are covered
- 5. Insert the sticks around the base of the candle

#### Ventilation in classrooms

One of the key measures to lower the risk of the virus spreading is ensuring that classrooms are well ventilated as much as possible. This has been happening since the children returned in September. This will continue to happen this term even though the weather is getting colder. So if you would like to send your child in with extra layers to keep them warm during this time, you are very welcome to do so. This could be an extra jumper, fleece or hoodie that children can put on if they are starting to feel cold - this doesn't have to be school uniform colours. Children can keep these on the back of their chair or under their tables so that they can get it if needed. Thank you for your support with this.

#### Dear Prime Minister

Having heard in the news this week about Priti Patel bullying different people at work, I thought how she should have been told off. You may be aware that this week has been anti bullying week (16-20 November 2020). I have learnt that bullying is not ok because it can make people feel unsafe and very upset. It then came to me that adults should also not be bullied. Priti Patel should have been told that the way she treated some of her colleagues is not acceptable.

At my school (Watton at Stone Primary and Nursery School) if you have bullied someone you would get a red card which means you will have to miss your whole lunchtime and would have to write a letter to your parents explaining what you had done. Bullying in my school is not tolerated so why should it be tolerated when you are an adult? I believe that action should be taken. I have been called rude names and

been made to feel upset and it is not a nice feeling, so why should it happen to adults. I believe there should be consequences for people who break the rules or behave badly, such as bullying.

As a result of what has happened this week with Priti Patel, people may think that it is ok to bully other people and get away with it. In anti-bullying week, a week where all children are learning about the consequences of bullying, it is a real shame that you have not taken the opportunity to show the whole country that behaviour like this is not acceptable and won't be tolerated. I feel you and the Government are not setting a good example to children and adults.

I hope that you will reflect on the way you have handled this and the message that has been sent to the country. I hope you will take on board what I have said to you, because what I have heard is not ok. Please think about how the people Priti Patel bullied feel.

## Parents and Carers requiring to self-isolate

If you are a parent or carer and have been asked to self-isolate as part of a bubble at work or because you have come into close contact with someone who has tested positive for coronavirus – you must follow the national self-isolation guidance and stay at home for 14 days: <a href="www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/self-isolation-and-treatment/how-long-to-">www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/self-isolation-and-treatment/how-long-to-</a>

self-isolate/

- This applies even if you have no symptoms and/or you have received a negative test result as it can take 14 days for transmission
- Self-isolation rules do not apply to the rest of your household, they can still attend work or school and complete day to day tasks in line with Government guidance
- If you develop symptoms while self-isolating, your entire household must begin selfisolating immediately
- If you would normally travel with your child(ren) to nursery, school or college, alternative arrangements should be made
- If you cannot make alternative travel arrangements for your child(ren), then they too must stay at home. Please contact your school or education setting directly for advice on remote learning in this situation
